<u>The Council</u> adopted conclusions on strengthening the use of means of fighting trafficking of firearms and invited all relevant actors, Member States, the Commission, Europol and Interpol to take the necessary measures to implement the actions foreseen in these conclusions. <u>The Council</u> took note of the report from the EU Counter-Terrorism Coordinator (CTC) on the implementation of counter-terrorism measures included in the Statement of the Members of the European Council of 12 February 2015. <u>The Council</u> agreed on five short-term measures, identified by the Presidency and the Counter-Terrorism Coordinator, where progress should be made before the December Council. These short-term measures are set out in doc. 12551/15.

(c) Railway safety: information on recent developments

<u>The Council</u> took note of a presentation by the Presidency of the results of the lunch discussions of the Ministers of Transport on railway security on 8 October 2015. <u>The Council</u> supported the Commission's initiative to launch a study on concrete measures which could be envisaged in the field of railway security.

The final results of the operations would only be available in December 2015. The Standing Committee on Operational Cooperation on Internal Security was mandated to have a strategic debate on the Joint Action Days 2016.

After substantial progress in July and September, <u>the Council</u> expressed a very large support to the Articles 24-33 plus Article 35 of the EPPO Regulation, as set out in the Presidency document, regarding investigations, prosecutions and procedural safeguards. However, it was made clear that these Articles would be re-visited once the full text was examined in order to ensure coherence. On this basis, the experts were invited to continue examining Articles 17 to 23 related to competencies of EPPO and rules on investigations. <u>Austria</u> made a statement, as set out in the <u>Addendum</u> (page 7).

18. <u>Consequences of the Maximilian Schrems v. Data Protection Commissioner judgement</u> of 6 October 2015 (C-362/14)

<u>The Commission</u> informed the Council about the consequences of the CJEU judgement (C-362/14, 6 October 2015) in the Schrems case. <u>The Commission</u> stressed the need to accelerate discussions on a safer framework for transfers of personal data with the USA and announced it would cooperate closely with national supervisory authorities to avoid fragmentation after the "Safe Harbour" Decision had been declared invalid.

19. <u>Accession of the Union to the European Convention for the Protection of Human Rights</u> <u>and Fundamental Freedoms</u>

<u>Ministers</u> took note of the state of play and further steps as regards the accession of the European Union to the European Convention for the Protection of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms.

<u>The Commission</u>, in its role as the EU negotiator, was invited to express the strong determination of the European Union to this process towards the partners in the Council of Europe and to come forward with a comprehensive analysis on the ways to address Opinion 2/13 by submitting to the Council technical written contributions on all aspects to be discussed.

<u>Ministers</u> supported the actions suggested by the Presidency as regards increased facilitation of investigations and prosecutions related to irregular immigrant smuggling, awareness-raising and training of judicial authorities on these matters, better cooperation with third countries, an improved investigation and prosecution of hate crime, the development of a dialogue with Internet providers and the commitment of national authorities to protect vulnerable groups. As a consequence, <u>the Commission</u> was in particular invited to provide the appropriate resources and intensify its dialogue with Internet providers.

21. <u>Implications of the Taricco judgement of 8 September 2015 (C-105/14) for ongoing files</u> = General debate

<u>Ministers</u> exchanged views on the implications of Taricco judgement in light of the possible inclusion of VAT fraud in the scope of the proposal for a Directive on the fight against fraud to the Union's financial interests by means of criminal law and the draft Regulation on the European Public Prosecutor's Office. <u>The Presidency</u> concluded that it would explore at the level of experts possible ways to address this question.

Ad "A" item 7:Draft Council Decision authorising respectively the Kingdom of
Belgium and the Republic of Poland to ratify and the Republic of
Austria to accede to the Budapest Convention on the Contract for the
Carriage of Goods by Inland Waterways (CMNI)
= Adoption

STATEMENT BY THE UNITED KINGDOM

"The United Kingdom supports the Council Decision authorising Austria, Belgium and Poland to ratify, or accede to, the Budapest Convention on the Contract for the Carriage of Goods by Inland Waterways (CMNI).

The Council Decision states that the Union has exclusive external competence in particular with regard to Article 29 of the Budapest Convention and, as such, the provisions of that Article affect the rules laid down in Council Regulation (EC) No. 593/2008 and is, therefore, binding on all Member States.

However, the United Kingdom wishes to draw attention to the fact that the legal base cited for the Council Decision to be adopted is pursuant to Title V Part III of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union. Consequently, the Council Decision will only bind the United Kingdom if it opts in to the Council Decision in accordance with Protocol 21 to the Treaties.

Accordingly, the United Kingdom has notified the President of the Council that it wishes to take part in the adoption and application of this Decision, in accordance with Article 3 of Protocol No.21 on the position of the United Kingdom and Ireland in respect of the area of Freedom, Security and Justice annexed to the Treaty on European Union and to the Treaty on the functioning of the European Union."

<u>Ad "A" item 14</u>: Commission Delegated Regulation (EU) .../... of 28.7.2015 supplementing Regulation (EU) No 952/2013 of the European Parliament and of the Council with regard to detailed rules specifying some of the provisions of the Union Customs Code = Intention not to raise objections to a delegated act

STATEMENT BY DENMARK

"Denmark supports the Union Customs Code and the delegated act, which ensures digitalization and streamlining of the custom legislation and processes.

However, ensuring a complete digitalization of national customs procedures and processes imposes a large, comprehensive and utterly expensive and complex task on Member States. An implementation plan where each Member State is to develop their own IT systems involves a significant risk for the implementation of the Union Customs Code as a whole.

Therefore, we strongly encourage the Commission to keep this in mind in its future implementing work, and to do its utmost to ensure that the financial implications at both national and European level are kept at a minimum."

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<u>Ad "B" item 9</u> :	The future of the return policy

STATEMENT BY SWEDEN

"In the context of EUs future return policy, in paragraph 12 of the Council Conclusions, Sweden strongly advocates that conditionality in development cooperation shall only be linked to country programming and countries' development plans. Guidance should be sought from the commitments in the Paris Declaration on Aid Effectiveness, endorsed in 2005, especially by paragraph 45 thereof."
