Subject:	Proposal for a Regulation of the European Parliament and of the Council on the protection of individuals with regard to the processing of personal data and on the free movement of such data (General Data Protection Regulation) - Chapter VIII

#### Introduction

1. At the Friends of Presidency DAPIX meeting of 14<sup>th</sup> October 2015 and with a view to the next trilogue, the Presidency invited delegations to discuss, on the basis of document 12734/15,
  - Chapter VIII – Remedies, Liability and Sanctions
  - Relevant recitals: (111), (112), (113), (113a), (114) EP, (115), (116) EP, (117) EP, (118), (118a), (118b), (119), (119a) EP, (120) and (120a).

2. Taking into account the General Approach reached on 15<sup>th</sup> June 2015 which constitutes the basis of the negotiation mandate for the Presidency, taking into account the discussions at the Friends of Presidency DAPIX meeting of 14th October 2015, as well as considering the European Parliament's position on Chapter VIII, the Presidency has put together compromise suggestions in the 4<sup>th</sup> column of the document in annex with a view to the next trilogue. The Presidency invites delegations to share their views on these suggestions.
3. The Presidency wishes to indicate that recitals have been adapted in accordance with the changes made in the relevant articles.
4. In order to ensure an efficient discussion process, as well as to maximise its clarity, the Presidency chose to divide the different provisions into three categories.

The first category (points 5 and 6) relates either to provisions on which the co-legislators have a consensual view or to provisions where the Presidency intends to maintain the Council's General Approach. With regard to this category, the Presidency takes the view that no further discussion is needed. However, in case delegations wish to raise any crucial point or to provide further input relating to these articles, they may do so under point 10.

The second category (point 7) relates to provisions where the Presidency suggests minor modifications based on the Council's General Approach, in order to simplify wording, to adapt cross-references or to align with provisions elsewhere in the Regulation. With regard to this category, the Presidency takes the view that no further discussion is needed.

The third category (points 8 and 9) relates to provisions where the position of the European Parliament and the Council's General Approach are diverging but where the Presidency, on the basis of the discussions during the Friends of Presidency DAPIX meeting of 14th October 2015, either identifies a compromise solution or suggests to maintain the Council's General Approach.

## Preparation for trilogue

5. Considering the position of the European Parliament and the Council's General Approach, delegations will note that there is a consensus on:

- Article 74 (3)
- Article 79 (3) chapeau, (3(a)), (4(a)), (4(b)), (5(a)), (5(b)), (5(c)), (5(d)), (5(e)), (5(f)) (5(g)), (6) as a whole

*The Presidency takes the view that no additional discussion is necessary on these provisions.*

6. The Presidency suggests to maintain the Council's General Approach as regards:

- Article 73 as a whole
- Article 74 (1), (3a), (4), (5)
- Article 75(1), (3), (4), (5)
- Article 76(3), (4), (5)
- Article 76a as a whole
- Article 77 (2), (3), (4), (5), (6)
- Article 78 as a whole
- Article 79 (2), (2a) EP, (2b) EP, (2c) chapeau EP, (2c(a)) EP, (2c(b)) EP, (2c(c)) EP, (2c(d)) EP, (2c(g)) EP, (2c(h)) EP, (2c(i)) EP, (2c(j)) EP, (2c(k)) EP, (2c(l)) EP, (2a) chapeau, (2a(a)), (2a(b)), (2a(d)), (2a(e)), (2a(f)), (2a(h)), (2a(j)), (2a(m)), (4)
- Article 79b(3)

*The Presidency takes the view that no additional discussion is necessary on these articles. However, in case delegations wish to raise any crucial point or to provide further input relating to these provisions, they may do so under point 10. Where the text from the European Parliament has not been taken on board by the Presidency, the 4<sup>th</sup> column is left empty.*

7. The Presidency suggests minor modifications to simplify wording, to adapt cross-references or to align with provisions elsewhere in the Regulation as regards:

- Recitals (118), (118b), (120), (120a)
- Article 74(2)
- Article 76(1), (2)
- Article 79(5)
- Article 79b(1)

8. With regard to the position of the European Parliament and the Council's General Approach, as well as Member States' comments during the Friends of Presidency DAPIX meeting of 14th October 2015, the Presidency considers that either compromises can be found or suggests to maintain the Council's General Approach:

#### Article 75 – Right to an effective judicial remedy against a controller or processor

- In relation to Article 75(2), the Council's General Approach and the European Parliament's text are consensual that the proceedings against a controller may among others *"be brought before the courts of the Member State where the data subject has his or her habitual residence"*. However, the European Parliament frames this in its Article 75(2) by adding *"unless the controller is a public authority of the Union or a Member State acting in the exercise of its public powers"*. The Presidency suggests not to add the terms *"of the Union or a Member State"* and to keep the Council's General Approach.

#### Article 76 – Representation of data subjects

- In Article 76(1) and concerning the additional reference by the European Parliament to its Article 77, the Presidency suggests to keep the Council's General Approach.

#### Article 77 – Right to compensation and liability

- In a spirit of compromise, concerning Article 77(1), the Presidency suggests to refer to the data subject having the right “*to claim and, where the claim is upheld, to receive compensation*”, as indicated in the 4<sup>th</sup> column.

#### Article 79 - General conditions for imposing administrative fines

- In its Article 79(2c), the European Parliament foresees a number of factors to be taken into account by supervisory authorities when deciding on an administrative sanction. Following the discussions at the Friends of Presidency DAPIX meeting, the Presidency takes the view there is flexibility for the inclusion of some points of the European Parliament’s text. For the time being, the Presidency suggests to include only points (e) and (f) as new points (g) and (ga) of Article 79(2a) as indicated in the 4<sup>th</sup> column.
  - Concerning Article 79(2a(i)), the Council’s General Approach foresees that supervisory authorities shall, when deciding whether to impose an administrative fine and deciding on the amount of the administrative fine give due consideration to the measures referred to in Article 53(1b(a)), (d), (e) and (f). The Presidency suggests to make a general reference to Article 53(1b).
  - The Presidency suggests to move the content of Article 79a(3a) to Article 79(2a).
9. With regard to the following provisions, the Presidency proposes modifications with a view to find compromise solutions taking into account the position of the European Parliament. The Presidency seeks additional views from delegations on the following points.

#### Article 79 - General conditions for imposing administrative fines

## Article 79a - Administrative fines

- Concerning the imposition of administrative fines, the Council's General Approach divides, in its Article 79a, the infringements which are to be sanctioned by fines into three categories. Each category defines a maximum level of fines for the individual infringements listed exhaustively in the relevant category. The European Parliament does not take such an approach but leaves it to the discretion of supervisory authorities to decide on the most appropriate sanction and, where applicable, the level of the fine. The Presidency takes the view that such an approach has some merits, in particular regarding the necessary margin for appreciation to be left to supervisory authorities when deciding on the type of sanction, including a fine and the amount of the fine. The Presidency suggests to go along with some elements of the approach taken by the European Parliament, as indicated in the 4<sup>th</sup> column. This has the consequence that Article 79a is deleted. Delegations are invited to confirm the approach proposed by the Presidency.
- Following the discussions at the Friends of Presidency DAPIX meeting, the Presidency based Article 79(1 new) on the European Parliament's text while sticking to the Council's maximum amount of the fines. For consistency reasons, the Presidency moved and adapted Article 79(1) of the Council's General Approach to Article 79(1a). At the same time, the Presidency is willing to better frame the system of sanctions in order to increase harmonisation. For that purpose, the Presidency added a reference to the consistency mechanism in Article 79(1b), based on recital (120), and suggests new wording in Article 66(1(ba)), drawing on the three categories in Article 79a of the Council's General Approach, to obtain guidelines from the European Data Protection Board on these provisions (see at the end of the 4 column document). Delegations are invited to share their views on this overall package.

- In Article 79(3b), the Council’s General Approach states that “*each Member State may lay down the rules on whether and to what extent administrative fines may be imposed on public authorities and bodies established in that Member State*”. Although the European Parliament does not foresee this possibility for Member States, but puts the public and the private sector on an equal footing when it comes to sanctions, the Presidency suggests to keep the Council’s General Approach. At the same time, the Presidency considers that this exception could be clarified by adding a reference to Article 53(1b) in order to indicate that it is without prejudice to the corrective powers of the supervisory authorities. Delegations are invited to indicate their flexibility on this clarification.
  
- In Article 79(7), the European Parliament keeps the delegated act for the purpose of updating the absolute amount of the administrative fines referred to in Article 79(1). As the Council has deleted this reference, delegations are invited to indicate their flexibility on the reintroduction of this delegated act.

10. Finally, the Presidency invites delegations to raise any other issue related to Chapter VIII.
