3. <u>European Semester 2016: Contribution to the European Council (17–18 March 2016)</u>

<u>The Council</u> held a policy debate on the implementation challenges of Country Specific Recommendations and national best practices, with a particular focus on those related to labour market segmentation and contractual arrangements.

Against an uncertain economic background, <u>Ministers</u> concurred there has been progress in CSR implementation. Though concrete results in the employment and social domain are displaying with a time lag, first results are beginning to show. They highlighted that a shared awareness of challenges, and widespread support and consensus, is crucial for any reform agenda. This implies in particular that social partners need to play an important role in the implementation and be closely involved in the reforms. Public and political support are key to achieve full ownership of the reform agenda, thus ensuring that it is effectively pursued.

Ministers highlighted that the specific historical and socioeconomic background needs to be taken into account when formulating CSRs. For this reason, CSRs need to be grounded on facts and evidence and on the specificities of Member States, and they need to focus on outcomes, indicating the broad objectives to be achieved. The redistributive effects of reforms remain a central issue - structural reforms need to be inclusive, paying attention to specific groups such as the young and the long-term unemployed.

developments concerning the "New start of social dialogue" and the background note.

<u>The Council</u> also took note of the information by the Commission and by the Presidency on the preparations for the next Tripartite Social Summit to take place on 16 March.

6. <u>Investing in Youth Employment: Implementation of the Youth Guarantee</u>

<u>The Council</u> endorsed the key messages of the Employment Committee on the way forward for the Youth Guarantee post-2016.

7. <u>Labour mobility package</u>

- Presentation by the Commission

<u>The Council</u> took note of the presentation by the Commission on the announced package to be presented in two steps: the targeted revision of the Posting Directive and a revision of the Regulation 883/2004 on Social Security Coordination. It announced that the Posting Directive should be discussed, and possibly adopted, by the collège of Commissioners on 8 March. The revision of Regulation 883/2004 was to be expected after the UK referendum in June 2016.

As the proposal was not yet adopted by the collège, <u>the Presidency</u> pointed out that no debate on substance was to take place at this stage. Nevertheless, <u>several delegations</u> expressed concerns about splitting the package and the timing of the proposal on the posting of workers. Several questions were raised on the principles of fair competition, freedom to provide services and the protection of worker's rights. <u>A number of other delegations</u> supported the Commission's approach. The Presidency indicated that it intends to start discussing the file immediately after publication.

8. <u>Towards a new Skills Agenda for Europe</u>

<u>The Council</u> held a policy debate based the Presidency Note as set out in doc. 6166/2016. The outcome of the debate should provide an input to the new Skills Agenda to be adopted by the Commission towards the end of the first semester 2016. <u>The Presidency</u> undertook to summarise the key messages in a joint letter to be sent to the Commission, together with the results of the debate in the Education Council of 24 February.

<u>Ministers</u> shared their experiences and exchanged their views on how to adapt best the skills to the needs of the labour markets, and thus to reduce the existing mismatch between labour demand and supply. In this context, they stressed the growing importance of transversal and digital skills. Life-long learning and recognition of formal and non-formal education have been referred to as a means to maintain competitiveness of the workforce in the labour market and to increase the employability. Ministers shared the view that the involvement of social partners at all levels was indispensable for the success of the transition to a modern 21st century society. A workforce with enhanced digital and socio-emotional skills would enable it to keep pace with the rapid technological and societal developments.

Noting that <u>HU</u> maintained a reservation on the LGBTI conclusions, <u>the President</u> concluded that the Council was unable to reach an agreement on the adoption of the two sets of Conclusions set out in docs. 6254/16 and 6255/1/16 REV 1, which had been presented as a package. The President indicated that the Council would return to this subject at its meeting in June.

<u>The Presidency</u> congratulated the Luxembourg Presidency for reaching an agreement on the Undeclared Work Platform Directive and the EURES Regulation. It informed that the Undeclared Work Platform was adopted by the Council on 24 February, while the EURES Regulation is to be adopted on 15 March. Both files should be published in the Official Journal as soon as the adoption process was finalised.

<u>The Commission</u> emphasised the link between the November 2015 Communication on the State of Energy Union on the transition to innovative low carbon technologies and the Skills Agenda, stressing the need for up-skilling the workforce in order adapt to the new challenges. Social partners should be strongly involved in the process. In this context, the Commission raised awareness to a new emerging phenomenon called "energy poverty".
