⁷ Since the creation of the European External Action Service (EEAS), only documents of the Service for Foreign Policy Instruments (FPI) are held by the European Commission. Statistics on the FPI encompass some initial applications received by the European Peace Facility (EPF). The EPF is an off-budget instrument that enhances the EU's ability to act as a global security provider. Under Commission Decision C(2021) 2011, the European Commission agreed to act as administrator, accounting officer and internal auditor for assistance measures of the EPF. Seven such initial applications and no confirmatory applications were submitted to the European Commission in its capacity as administrator for assistance measures in 2025.

⁸ Member State authorities is a category created in 2018 to reflect the fact that national authorities of Member States are entitled to submit applications for access to documents under Regulation (EC) No 1049/2001. Since the EASE application was created in September 2022, the social/occupational category field has become optional when submitting a request using the portal. This has resulted in the 'Unknown' category for applicants who left the social/occupational category blank.
