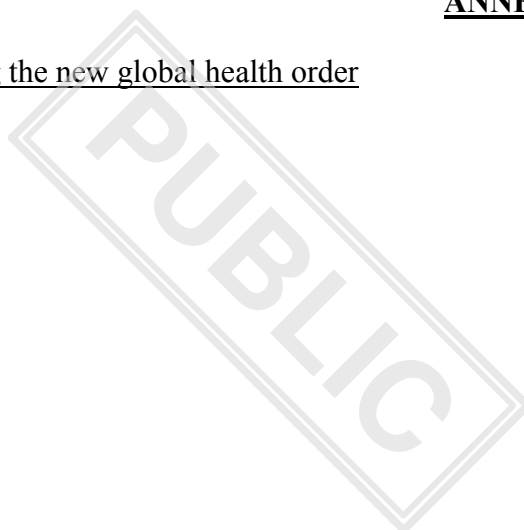

The new Global Health Strategy: shaping the new global health order

1. Global health requires a robust multilateral approach. This must be further strengthened, by making the WHO and global health initiatives more efficient, with effective governance and adequate financing. This reform should ensure transparency, accountability, effectiveness and enforceability of rules—**DELETED**

In this sense, how can we best support multilateralism with the WHO at its core?

2. To flank and further support multilateral work, the strategy should arguably enhance bilateral cooperation (with single third countries) and plurilateral cooperation (within other fora such as the G7, G20 or the OECD), as well as developing strategic partnerships on health with other regions in the world, based on mutual responsibility and effectiveness (cooperation with the US or the AU-EU summit of February 2022 are key examples in this respect).

In this sense, how can we best engage with bilateral and plurilateral partners? Which are the key partners and which areas of work should be prioritised with each of them?

3. Furthermore, global philanthropic organisations take an increasing place in the dialogue on global health, with a funding volume higher than many donor countries provide on their own. In addition, a dynamic array of private and public actors and global health initiatives have emerged. Our strategy should arguably ensure that EU and global efforts are synergistic and complementary, avoiding fragmentation and duplication, **DELETED**
