OPINION

Union Civil Protection Mechanism

THE EUROPEAN COMMITTEE OF THE REGIONS (CoR)

- calls on the Member States to fully involve their regions in the development, implementation and governance of disaster prevention, preparedness and response strategies, including health preparedness strategies and cross-border preparedness plans, and provide them with adequate resources in line with the principle of subsidiarity and a multilevel governance approach;
- calls on the Member States to involve and support NGOs and local civil society formations in the development and support of disaster prevention, preparedness and response strategies;
- finds that the earmarked EUR 10.7 bn spread over seven years and shared with health emergency preparedness and response might not be sufficient; stresses that local and regional authorities, as first responders in most crises, must be adequately supported through predictable, accessible and ring-fenced funding;
- emphasises that it is imperative to involve local and regional authorities in preparing, implementing and evaluating the national regional partnership plans to ensure a multilevel governance approach in accordance with the subsidiarity principle;
- reiterates the need to strengthen the UCPM with faster mobilisation of local and regional modules, streamlined accreditation and better coordination with local, regional and national emergency services;
- stresses the key role of volunteers and NGOs in emergencies and underlines the importance of a framework for structured interaction and effective coordination between LRAs, emergency services, and civil society in maximising the value of their contribution involving them as formal strategic partners in resilience building, with influence, resources and long-term support.

I. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR AMENDMENTS

Amendment 1

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Reason
Many disasters are initially managed by local and regional authorities as well as local or regional professional third-sector entities and emergency services. Explicit mention of the local and regional

levels clarifies their role and fosters better integration within the UCPM framework. Information about collecting data for risk assessments as an important factor to prevent the impact on various groups of people could be added.

The other suggested amendments are for editing purposes.

The Commission and the Member States shall, where appropriate, ensure an adequate geographical distribution of rescEU capacities, <i>taking into account strategic importance, regional diversification needs, specific conditions, accessibility and proximity to specific risks;</i>

<i>Reason</i>
Emphasising regional diversity and relating it to strategy as a key element.

II. POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

THE EUROPEAN COMMITTEE OF THE REGIONS (CoR)

1. welcomes the timely revision of the Union Civil Protection Mechanism (UCPM) in the worsening risk and threat landscape driven by natural and human-induced crises, climate change and environmental degradation, and the current geopolitical context, which has clearly demonstrated the need to strengthen Europe's overall preparedness, prevention and response capabilities in an all-hazard, whole-of-government and whole-of-society approach, and cooperation in the field of civil protection at Union level specifically;
2. recognises that civil protection policies are primarily the responsibility of the Member States, but reiterates that prevention, societal and health preparedness strategies, and response and relief activities are very often carried out by local actors, cities and municipalities, or regions;
3. stresses that the development of new Union crisis coordination structures should preserve flexibility for Member States and local and regional authorities to respond according to their specific risk profiles;
4. calls on the Member States to fully involve their regions in the development, implementation and governance of disaster prevention, preparedness and response strategies, including health preparedness strategies and cross-border preparedness plans, and provide them with adequate resources in line with the principle of subsidiarity and a multilevel governance approach; calls for this involvement to include formal partnership mechanisms with local and regional authorities and relevant volunteer-based local action groups;
5. calls on the Member States to involve and support NGOs and local civil society formations, volunteer-based local action groups and community safety organisations, including volunteer firefighters, rescue services and community emergency units in the development and support of disaster prevention, preparedness and response strategies;
6. recognises that climate change and environmental degradation are increasing the frequency and intensity of natural disasters; stresses the need for a comprehensive and cross-cutting approach to disaster prevention and preparedness, including the role of nature-based solutions and ecosystem in creation of dual use infrastructure;
7. welcomes the Commission's particular attention on disaster prevention, preparedness and response strategies to explicitly address the needs of vulnerable and marginalised groups; emphasises the importance of maintaining equal access to assistance and support systems, with a particular focus on social resilience; stresses that exposure to disaster risks is not neutral to socio-economic conditions: low-income communities, informal settlements, people with disabilities, older persons and marginalised groups;

On funding

8. welcomes and supports the substantial increase in the indicative financial envelope under the current proposal; finds, however, that the earmarked EUR 10.7 bn spread over seven years and shared with health emergency preparedness and response might not be sufficient in light of the scale and increasing frequency of climate-related, health, resources, social and security crises; stresses that local and regional authorities, as first responders in most crises, must be adequately supported through predictable, accessible and ring-fenced funding, including dedicated support for volunteer-based local action groups and community emergency organisations; calls, in this regard, for civil protection and disaster resilience objectives to be explicitly mainstreamed into the post-2027 cohesion policy framework; stresses that direct access mechanisms for local and regional authorities should be introduced;
9. emphasises that it is imperative to involve local and regional authorities in preparing, implementing and evaluating the national regional partnership plans to ensure a multilevel governance approach in accordance with the subsidiarity principle;
10. emphasises that adequate funding must be ensured for the implementation of the mechanism, but it is also crucial to ensure that these funds effectively reach the local level;
11. repeats its proposal that a bigger emergency fund and an increased general flexibility reserve package be built into the Multiannual Financial Framework Regulation from the outset to respond to unforeseen shocks and emerging challenges²;
12. stresses the importance of ensuring that the public have clear and accessible access to information on the aid and support mechanisms available in the aftermath of a disaster, including financial aid, administrative procedures and assistance services. Special attention should be paid to people in vulnerable situations and to areas with limited connectivity or access to public services;

On the UCPM, rescEU and the Union disaster resilience goals

13. reiterates the need to strengthen the UCPM with faster mobilisation of local and regional modules, streamlined accreditation and better coordination with local, regional and national emergency services, including volunteer firefighters, community safety organisations, rescue services and other volunteer-based local action groups;
14. recognises dual-use infrastructure as an element in the system of preparedness and response to and recovery from a natural or man-made disaster, adversity or armed aggression, also keeping in mind defence considerations while highlighting that such infrastructure should primarily support effective civil protection and crisis response, contributing to the resilience of communities and critical infrastructure; further emphasises that civil-military cooperation can enhance overall crisis response;

15. stresses the key role of volunteers and NGOs in emergencies and underlines the importance of a framework for structured interaction and effective coordination between LRAs, emergency services, and civil society in maximising the value of their contribution involving them as formal strategic partners in resilience building, with influence, resources and long-term support; calls on Member States to establish partnership mechanisms with volunteer-based local action groups, including consultation, training, exercises and access to relevant funding;
16. emphasises the growing importance of psychosocial support and mental health services as an integral component of disaster response and post-disaster recovery; calls on the Commission and Member States to include mental health preparedness in national civil protection strategies, invest in training first responders in psychological first aid; calls for this dimension to be formally integrated into the UCPM framework and into the Knowledge Network's training and capacity-building programmes;
17. calls on the Member States to increase the emphasis on data collection and aggregation, and scientific and research cooperation in the field of crisis response, ensuring that disaster risk assessments integrate the latest climate science, biodiversity considerations and forward-looking projections;
18. emphasises the need for cooperation with the Emergency Response Coordination Centre (ERCC) and for preparedness to communicate, support and develop countermeasures;
19. highlights that rescEU has proven its worth and supports the Commission's proposal to continue to increase and expand its strategic reserves;
20. suggests focusing on expanding the range of emergency response items for EU-level stockpiling and developing multi-purpose and multi-use capacities, such as electricity, telecommunications, transport and logistics but also specialised expertise for specific hazards and especially chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear (CBRN) countermeasures, so as to be able to provide support in a variety of situations, including defence considerations; acknowledges that EU stockpiling should be coordinated at EU level, while ensuring that decisions are informed by regional needs, connected to regional partners, and operationalised through regional implementation mechanisms³;
21. suggests focusing on developing own diversified and resilient supply chains, including strengthening EU production capacity resources and capability to manufacture in Member States crucial items needed to prevent, avoid, and take countermeasures against, crises and disasters, while promoting its own economic strength and ensuring a solidarity-based approach to the distribution of resources;
22. emphasises that, in practice, agricultural activity and livestock farming are essential components in maintaining basic services and supply. They should therefore be considered in civil protection

and resilience planning, complementing the EU's security and defence policies; stresses the need to ensure a minimum level of agricultural self-sufficiency, including in areas where profitability is limited, by maintaining farms and production infrastructure where this is necessary to ensure continuity of supply, local and regional stability and the ability to respond to crisis situations;

23. supports the further development of Union disaster resilience goals and the requirement for Member States to submit to the Commission, at least every three years, summaries of risk assessments, response capacities and related activities prepared in cooperation with local and regional authorities;
24. notes that the proposal does not mandate a multilevel governance approach for these plans, which risks overlooking local and regional vulnerabilities and thus creating gaps in preparedness and resilience;
25. notes the creation of the Crisis Coordination Hub as support for resilience and expects it to deliver added value in practice;

On health emergency preparedness and response

26. calls on the Commission to fully account for the fact that the management of health systems is decentralised to a greater or lesser extent in 19 out of 27 Member States; ensure that the UCPM's health emergency preparedness and response framework meaningfully involves regional and local health authorities, supports their capacity-building through dedicated funding, and remains aligned with existing decentralised governance structures;
27. emphasises that, in terms of medical countermeasures, the EU is still largely dependent on third countries;
28. reiterates its strong warning to the Commission and the Council about the insufficient efforts to enhance Europe's own production of the products and medicines we need to deal with health crises, and about the practices of public buyers;
29. underlines the strategic importance of ensuring resilient supply chains, sufficient connectivity and continued access to essential goods in remote, island and outermost regions, especially during crises or disasters; stresses, in particular, the need to strengthen the security of the medical, pharmaceutical, food, energy and logistics supply, as well as maritime, air and digital connectivity, to ensure a swift response and the continuity of essential services.
