## NOTE FROM THE FRENCH AUTHORITIES

**Subject:** Extension of border controls from 1 November 2021 to 30 April 2022 at France's internal land borders with Belgium, Luxembourg, Germany, the Swiss Confederation, Italy and Spain, and at its air and sea borders.

Encl.: Updated list of authorised crossing points.

On 2 April 2021, the French authorities notified the European Commission of the renewal of internal border controls from 1 May 2021 to 31 October 2021.

With this period of extension coming to an end, the jihadist terrorist threat remains at a high level in France where, since the beginning of 2021, one attack has been carried out and three attacks have been foiled. The 'enhanced security — risk of attack' level of the Vigipirate plan, which was renewed on 5 March 2021, is consequently being maintained.

The start, in September 2021, of the trial for the attacks on 13 November 2015 necessitates increased vigilance. Media coverage of the trial is likely to give rise to further attacks, as occurred with the trial for the Charlie Hebdo attacks, in September 2020: two journalists were injured in an attack with a cleaver carried out by a Pakistani national, declared as a single minor, who had illegally entered French territory.

The acute nature of this threat is corroborated by Europol's 2021 report on the situation and trends in terrorism<sup>1</sup>, which highlights the risk that media coverage of the 2015 attacks will inspire isolated individuals to commit similar acts, particularly in France.

Moreover, international developments suggest that the terrorist threat is unlikely to decrease in the coming months. The Taliban's takeover of power in Afghanistan is indeed a factor of international instability which, as has been the case in the past, could have an impact on the terrorist threat in Europe. France is one of the countries with one of the largest Afghan communities in Europe. It also has the largest contingent of terrorist fighters abroad and is therefore particularly affected by the growing risk of foreign fighters returning due to the instability of the military situation in northern Syria (including following an entry not detected by another Schengen State). The situation in the detention and refugee camps in the north-east of Syria, where hundreds of European women jihadists are currently being held, also remains unstable.

This exogenous threat is proven. Several plans for attacks by foreign fighters, former ISIS members who entered France irregularly, have been foiled over the last two years. Individuals of foreign origin with profiles comparable to those of those who committed attacks in France in 2020 have been arrested by the French authorities in 2021 and two cells consisting of persons of Chechen origin were dismantled in eastern France in spring 2021. In his thirteenth report on the threat posed by ISIL (Da'esh)<sup>2</sup>, the UN Secretary-General considered that, after a period of calm, the number of terrorist attacks in Europe could rise again in the coming months.

Finally, in recent months we have seen violent demonstrations in the Muslim world in response to Charlie Hebdo's publication of caricatures of Mohammed. Europol has also highlighted, in its analyses, the exploitation of this phenomenon by jihadist propaganda to incite terrorist attacks in France and other European countries.

These facts show that the terrorist threat remains present, serious and exogenous.

In this regard, the checks carried out at the internal borders between 1 March and 31 August 2021 proved their effectiveness, since they enabled 61 783 refusals of entry to be issued and 25 032 alerts in the national and European systems to be detected. In addition, since the beginning of 2021, on all the main routes to the European Union, 76 214 irregular arrivals have been recorded, an average of 299 persons per day. This represents an increase of 40% compared to the same period in 2020 (54 418)<sup>3</sup> France remains one of the main destination countries for secondary movements within the European Union and this dynamic represents a considerable increase in risks to our territory. The EU legislation currently in force does not guarantee that real security checks are carried out for persons crossing the external border irregularly. In this situation, internal border controls are an inevitable consequence of the shortcomings observed at the external borders. France supports the work undertaken by the Commission, in particular through the draft screening regulation, to address these difficulties.

At the same time, the risks associated with the COVID-19 outbreak remain high at national and European level. France reached 81% vaccination coverage in September 2021, but this rate is still insufficient in the face of more communicable variants — including the Delta variant which is predominant in all European countries — that are spreading in France and among our European neighbours. The significant increase in the number of cases in the Schengen area between July and September<sup>4</sup> and the sharp slowdown or even stagnation of vaccination campaigns in the majority of Member States make it necessary to maintain a high level of vigilance. Since March 2020, France has done everything possible to control the circulation of the virus, in particular by putting in place a series of lockdowns, a curfew and currently a health pass (required to access a large number of transport, leisure, cultural and food service facilities). In this context, internal borders should not constitute a loophole in the fight against the circulation of the virus and it must therefore remain possible to carry out health checks where necessary.

All these factors explain the need to continue to control intra-Schengen cross-border movement in order to ensure public security and order.

For these reasons, France hereby notifies that it will extend the controls at its internal borders from 1 November 2019 until 30 April 2022, in accordance with the provisions of Articles 25 and 27 of the Schengen Borders Code. This decision has been taken following an evaluation of the necessity and proportionality of these controls in view of the threat to public order (including public health), based on up-to-date risk assessments. The reintroduction of internal border controls remains a measure of last resort and the French authorities wish to reaffirm their commitment to the principle of free movement of persons, one of the founding principles of the European Union.

In this respect, the French authorities are particularly careful to avoid controls at internal borders impeding the movement of persons and goods more than is strictly necessary, and take all measures to ensure that the impact of these controls on the flow of traffic is limited. In particular, they take care to deploy sufficient staff to the most commonly used transit areas in order to limit the impact that these controls might have on the flow of traffic. Currently, 3 500 to 4 000 staff are mobilised on a daily basis to protect all our borders.

The updated list of authorised crossing points is attached to this notification.

In this connection, the Minister of the Interior will send a letter to the authorities of neighbouring Member States informing them of this decision and of our wish to continue to ensure effective cross-border cooperation.
