



NO → ports with ferry connections to the Schengen area.



#### Impact of the consultation process - main findings:


- More transparency regarding Member States' actions
- Intensified information sharing and cross-border cooperation
- Mitigate impact: flexible checks, often based on risk assessment, use of new technologies
- Well-functioning police cooperation

9000 people detected using fraudulent documents (Jan-July 2023)




