	- Outcome of the first technical meeting with the European Parliament

- 1. Based on the negotiating mandate approved by Coreper on 12 November 2021¹, the Presidency held on 16 November 2021 a first informal meeting at technical level with the European Parliament (EP).
- 2. On 15 November, the Culture and Education Committee of the Parliament had an exchange of views on its report on the European Year of Youth². The report is expected to be endorsed by the EP plenary on 22 November 2021.

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- 3. During the first informal meeting at technical level, all the articles were examined while only some recitals were discussed. The European Parliament accepted the Council text for Article 8 and Recitals 8 and 12. The Presidency accepted the amendments of the European Parliament on Article 3.d. The text agreed during the informal meeting is in the annex to this note under the column "Presidency compromise".
- 4. A compromise was reached on the need to merge recitals covering the same issues such as Recitals 6 a) and 7 related to Article 2.4; Recitals 9 and 23 a), Recitals 9 a) and 16 and Recitals 11 a) and 11 b).
- 5. For the co-legislators, the outstanding issue is the budget for which the EP has proposed new articles (Articles 5 a) and 5 b) related to Recital 23 put into brackets by the Council). At the meeting, the Commission informed the legislators that the information about the financing would be presented before the trilogue on 6 December 2021. It was therefore decided to postpone the discussion on the budget.
- 6. During the meeting, it was also agreed to examine the Recitals 13 to 26 during the second informal meeting at technical meeting. This meeting will be held on 24 November 2021. The Presidency will debrief of its outcome at the informal videoconference of the members of the Youth Working Party on 25 November 2021.
