#### 1 DIRECTOR'S FOREWORD

After too long a silence, Agriculture and Rural Development (ARD) seems to be back on the agenda. The 2008 World Development Report on Agriculture published by the World Bank is a recent illustration of this strategic change that is progressively taking place among donors and international organisations. One has to recognise that achieving the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) will definitely not be possible if there is no massive and immediate investment in ARD which is still the main economic sector in most Africa, Caribbean and Pacific (ACP) countries. As stated by François Bourguignon, Sr. Vice President and Chief Economist at The World Bank, 'growth in agriculture makes a disproportionately positive contribution to reducing poverty. More than half of the population in developing countries lives in rural areas, where poverty is most extreme.'

In Africa for instance, ARD is one of the main pillars of the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD) strategy through the Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP) and the European Union (EU) is working in the framework of its new strategy for Africa on advancing African Agriculture. A broad consensus seems to exist on the need to concentrate efforts in ARD (e.g. the Ministers' of Agriculture declaration on committing 10 % of gross domestic product (GDP) to ARD by 2010). Now deeds and concrete actions are required.

The Technical Centre for Agricultural and Rural Cooperation (CTA) is committed to this global fight against poverty through fostering the development of ARD in ACP countries (see CTA's Strategic Plan 2007 – 2010 / SP, <a href="http://www.anancy.net/uploads/file\_en/CTA-SP%2007-10%20EN-DEF.pdf">http://www.anancy.net/uploads/file\_en/CTA-SP%2007-10%20EN-DEF.pdf</a>).

Let me briefly point out some key aspects of this Plan. Based on the recommendations of an external evaluation and several audits it constitutes a reform agenda for increasing efficiency and improving sustainability. The main objectives are as follows:

- to increase CTA's outreach and efficiency further; providing equitable assistance to ACP countries
   / CTA products and services reaching increasingly all ACP countries;
- to facilitate access to information rather than providing information ourselves;
- to increase awareness on the important role of agriculture for development in ACP countries through public media and journalist networks;
- to strengthen the partner networks through capacity building including advocacy work on investment in ICT infrastructure.

CTA's new strategic direction, which will be applied to its operations in 2008 will involve:

- systematically surveying the appropriate 'markets' for information products and services in ACP and EU countries – this will enable CTA to identify its niche, maintain its comparative advantage, and avoid duplicating the efforts of other development agencies;
- completing the Information, Communication Management (ICM) country needs assessment studies leading to developing and implementing comprehensive, well integrated programmes based on expressed needs;
- moving gradually away from somewhat ad hoc and country-targeted assistance towards providing assistance to 'the most needy";
- adopting a more systematic and business-oriented approach for dissemination of CTA's products and services:
- addressing the bottleneck of difficult or insufficient access to information and making information more easily understandable by:

- placing emphasis on reducing complexity and producing succinct messages:
- o continuing to publicise CTA's new 'Practical Guide' series of leaflets providing simple, easily replicable information produced in a pragmatic and concise way, enabling easy adaptation into local farmers' languages.
- using ICTs as CTA's leading resource/innovative force including the development of innovative products using conventional media and ICTs, suitable for mass distribution;
- strengthening collaboration with local networks (in-country) and change agents at national. regional and international levels.

CTA will invest special efforts in new thematic priorities defined by the SP such as climate change, biodiversity, biofuels, pandemics but also product diversification and differentiation strategies. Monitoring the agricultural aspect of the Economic Partnership Agreements (EPAs) implementation including the general discussion on how to operationalise Aid for Trade in the agricultural sector will be also important areas of our work in 2008.

At the institutional level, CTA will continue to strengthen links to its supervisory authorities, including ACP and European Commission (EC) partners (ambassadors, national authorising officers, relevant EC directorates and EU delegations), involving them more systematically in the implementation of the Centre's activities. Within the Centre itself, we will facilitate the creation of formal or informal interdepartmental teams on the basis of development themes or ICM services, to work on critical issues. We will also seek to increase the number of ICT specialists in CTA's skills mix and find innovative ways of increasing CTA's staff complement.

The years 2006 (see Annual report: <a href="http://www.anancy.net/uploads/file\_en/CTA\_AR06\_EN.pdf">http://www.anancy.net/uploads/file\_en/CTA\_AR06\_EN.pdf</a>) and half of 2007 have been very intense and considerable efforts allowed us to raise our profile and make our partners and beneficiaries more aware of CTA's services (see new CTA flyer). In 2008 we will continue to improve our efficiency thereby ensuring the increasing impact of our activities on the ground. CTA will continue linking up our own activities with other ARD programmes funded under the 10th European Development Fund (EDF).

Please allow me to highlight that with current budget levels CTA will definitively lack the financial resources needed to extend significantly the outreach of our activities. Additional funds are a MUST in order to be able to respond to an increasing demand and to serve more and more ACP partners and beneficiaries.

Provided with adequate funding, CTA will continue to maintain the quality of its services and products in 2008 while trying to maximize its outreach. The following document summarises CTA's main activities for 2008 under fourteen programmes in the form of detailed one-page profiles providing a concise and clear overview at a glance.

#### INTRODUCTORY NOTE TO THE REVISED DRAFT 2008 BUDGET

The draft Programme of Activities and Budget for 2008 are the first that the Centre can base completely on the 2007-2010 Strategic Plan that it transmitted to its supervisory authorities in the Spring of 2007. This plan, which runs from the 9<sup>th</sup> into the 10<sup>th</sup> EDF, has taken into account not only the recommendations of the external evaluation of the previous plan for 2001-2005 and the financial and organization audits commissioned by the European Commission, but also the results of internal evaluations of the programmes and the opinions, observations and recommendations of its partners.

CTA submitted, in mid-2006, a proposed programme and budget for the 10<sup>th</sup> EDF of around €120 million, including approximately €18 million for 2008. This proposal is based on the above mentioned elements and obviously on the demographic growth of the CTA target groups, namely the agricultural and rural populations in the ACP countries. It also takes account of the consequences that the European Commission's policy of putting agriculture at the forefront of development, in the same way as the World Bank, may have on the populations of these countries.

Unfortunately, in the end, the decision concerning the reallocation of the funds of the 9<sup>th</sup> EDF by the ACP-EU Council of Ministers of May 2007, added only €2 million to the €14 million initially programmed by the European Commission for 2008, reducing to €16 million the Centre's initial budget proposal which was €18 million. This difference will clearly lead to the scope of projects within the framework of the Strategic Plan being reduced for the beneficiaries. It will also, of course, limit the recruitment of indispensable expertise, in particular in the area of information and communication technologies and the acquisition of the IT equipment needed to support the development of activities and increase the efficiency of CTA and its ability to take up the challenge of making it easier for small scale farmers in the ACP countries to have access to information.

The funds currently available at the level of the EDF mean that we have to reduce our draft budget from 16.2 to 14.2 m€, as was the case in 2006 and 2007, with a slight hope of receiving the 2 million before the end of the financial year 2008. However, we have not reduced the non-reducible expenses in Titles I (staff costs) and II (operating costs) to avoid being forced, if insufficient funds are available, to request a new authorization for a budget transfer from operational expenses to staff and operating expenses.

It is important to underscore the key role of information, communication and capacity building in development and in attaining the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). Only an adequate budget, such as the one originally proposed, will enable CTA to fulfill its responsibilities and carry out its mandate effectively.


