Subject: State of play regarding the ratification of the Istanbul Convention by the EU

It will soon be five years since, on 13 June 2017, the European Union signed the Act of Accession to the Council of Europe Convention on preventing and combating violence against women and domestic violence.

Parliament has repeatedly called on the Council to conclude its work on the EU's ratification of the convention immediately.

On 6 October 2021, the Court of Justice confirmed that the accession process to the convention can be completed at any time by the Council through a qualified majority vote, which gives it the possibility to complete the EU's ratification of the convention through a procedure that does not require unanimity.

In view of the above, I would like to ask the Council the following questions:

- 1. What is the status of its work on finalising the EU's ratification of the convention?
- 2. What specific steps has it taken following the Court of Justice ruling of 6 October 2021 on ratifying the Istanbul Convention, and when did it take them?

The Council has repeatedly expressed its strong commitment to preventing and eliminating all forms of violence against women and acknowledged the importance of the Istanbul Convention as a landmark on the path towards that goal¹. In this context, the Honourable Member is invited to refer to the Council's reply to Written Question E-002076/2021.

Since the Court of Justice of the European Union adopted Opinion 1/19 on 6 October 2021², discussions within the Council have been relaunched.

The Council is not in a position to foresee the outcome or the duration of these discussions.
