

Subject: Prolongation of border controls at the Icelandic internal borders.

To combat further spread of the Covid-19 virus, Icelandic authorities reintroduced internal border control at all internal borders (air and sea) for 10 days on 24 April 2020. The measure was prolonged for 11 days from 4 May 2020 and again for 20 days from 15 May 2020.

As other member states Iceland has slowly started to ease its restrictions and therefore thinks it is still necessary to prolong border controls at all internal borders in Iceland (air and sea borders). The prolongation is based on a risk assessment by the National Commissioner of the Icelandic Police and recommendations from the Icelandic Chief Epidemiologists on the ongoing need for mandated quarantine upon arrival. Therefore, pursuant to Art. 28. of Regulation 2016/399 on the rules governing the movements of persons across borders (Schengen Borders Code), Iceland kindly informs the Commission that it will prolong border controls until 15 June 2020.

With only a few infections having been confirmed for the whole month of May Iceland continues on a good path towards controlling the virus with broad based testing and tracing measures.
