Statement by Greece

"Overall, Greece welcomes the amendment of Council Recommendation 2020/912. While we maintain our position that the third countries list in ANNEX I should be eventually abandoned, we believe that the proposed amendments go in the right direction, moving gradually from the "safe country" to the "safe passenger" approach.

Nonetheless, we would like to express our concerns regarding the following points of the amended Recommendation:

Firstly, regarding the 14-day cumulative Covid-19 case notification rate, we believe that **75** is particularly low and hard to justify, taking into account that the EU average is approximately 400. Besides, the case notification rate is not the only decisive factor to be taken into account as it is combined with other quantitative and qualitative criteria. In this context, the positivity rate is of particular relevance. Moreover, according to the Recommendation, MS can impose testing or quarantine requirements on incoming travelers from countries listed in Annex I. Therefore, Greece would favor a higher and more reasonable threshold, such as **200**, i.e. the half of the EU average.

Secondly, regarding the categories of accepted vaccines mentioned in point 6a, we believe that we should not include only those that have been authorized by EMA or have completed the WHO Emergency Use Listing process. MS should be given the flexibility to accept vaccination certificates for vaccines that have been granted authorization at national level as well. This will allow us to avoid discriminating between several vaccines which have been approved by the competent national authorities and are widely used in third countries, but have not yet completed the EMA or the WHO authorization process.

Thirdly, regarding the number of the administrated doses in point 6a, we also believe that limiting the entry of third country residents only to those who are fully vaccinated is unnecessarily over-restrictive, if we take into account the fact that in many cases a high level of immunity is achieved after the administration of the first dose. In this context, MS should have the flexibility to accept travellers who have received at least one dose of a Covid-19 vaccine."

Statement by Spain

"Spain would have wished to maintain the highest possible level of ambition in the revision of the Directive on the conditions of entry and residence of third-country nationals for the purposes of highly skilled employment ("Blue Card Directive"). In particular, Spain considers the revised EU-wide "Blue Card" scheme should be open to recognising high-level professionals skills and relevant experience and not only formal qualifications. We are facing a changing labour market where companies are increasingly asking for skilled staff who may not have a degree or a formal qualification, but who have skills proving that they are high-level professionals. Therefore, we consider this should not have been limited to only one sector, the ICT sector. However, we support the compromise reached given the importance of having in place a revised Blue Card Directive that helps consolidating a European scheme for highly-skilled regular migration."

Statements by the Commission

"on a geopolitical dialogue with the European Parliament on the Neighbourhood, Development and International Cooperation Instrument – Global Europe:

The European Commission, mindful of the European Parliament's functions of political control laid down in Article 14 of the Treaty on the European Union, commits to conduct a high-level geopolitical dialogue between the two institutions on the implementation of Regulation (EU) XXX/XXX of the European Parliament and of the Council establishing the Neighbourhood, Development and International Cooperation Instrument (NDICI) – Global Europe. This dialogue should allow exchanges with the European Parliament, whose positions on the implementation of the NDICI will be fully taken into consideration.

The geopolitical dialogue will discuss general orientations on the implementation of the NDICI, including on programming before the adoption of programming documents, and concerning specific subjects such as the use of the emerging challenges and priorities cushion or applying leverage leading to possible changes in allocation of funding dedicated to migration or suspension of assistance to a partner country when it persistently fails to observe the principles of democracy, the rule of law, good governance, respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms.

The geopolitical dialogue will be structured as follows:

i) A high-level dialogue between the High Representative/Vice President and the Commissioners in charge of International Partnerships and of Neighbourhood and Enlargement and the European Parliament.

ii) A permanent dialogue at senior officials' level with AFET and DEVE working groups to ensure an adequate preparation and follow-up to the high-level dialogue.

The high-level dialogue will take place at least twice a year. One of the meetings may coincide with the presentation by the Commission of the draft annual budget."

"on Recitals 50 and 51 and Article 8.10:

Regional migration support programmes will support comprehensive, balanced and tailormade partnerships with relevant countries of origin or transit and host countries, following a flexible incitative approach, and supported by the coordination mechanism within the Neighbourhood, Development and International Cooperation Instrument – Global Europe. They will be complemented by actions under the country programmes, where appropriate. In order to ensure the most efficient and impactful use of these funds, in line with the Union's and partner countries' policy priorities, the European Commission will actively implement these priorities using all relevant Union instruments and participate in the coordination with the Member States in a synchronised and efficient manner. It will ensure that the European Parliament and the Council are closely and regularly informed, allowing for exchanges of views."

Statement by Hungary

"Hungary had been in favour of the swift adoption and implementation of the NDICI regulation, and has accepted several compromises throughout the negotiations, while also recognizing that most of our red lines have been addressed too. Hungary supports that tackling migration and enforcing cooperation on migration will play a key role in implementing the NDICI instrument.

However, Hungary continues to have serious concerns regarding legal migration, which is part of the NDICI regulation. When it comes to legal migration, it cannot be disregarded that the pandemic has brought about serious changes in the economic situation and the labour markets of the European Union. Worrying developments are characterized by the fact that hundreds of thousands of EU citizens have lost their jobs since the crisis began. The pandemic has caused an unprecedented health emergency in most countries of the world, highlighting the fact that the uncontrolled flow of masses – in addition to being an extremely serious security threat – also poses a serious health risk. Hungary's primary goal in this critical situation is to protect its own citizens, as well as to protect the European Union and all its inhabitants from an epidemiological point of view. Hungary has therefore made the decision not to support any forms of legal migration to the European Union in addition to illegal migration, underlining that legal migration is not the right solution to address economic and labour market challenges. Focus instead should be placed on providing decent work and living conditions to our own citizens. In light of the above position, and without wishing to block the adoption of the NDICI regulation, Hungary abstains from voting. Concerning references to the EU Gender Action Plans and relevant Council Conclusions in the regulation, it must be pointed out that the third Gender Action Plan (GAP III) adopted by the European Commission and the High Representative on 25 November 2020, has not been endorsed by all Member States by means of Council Conclusions. As the third Gender Action Plan is based on a definition of gender which is not compatible with our national position, Hungary shall not take part in the implementation of the GAP III."

"First, let me thank the Portuguese Presidency for its tireless work to conclude the negotiations on the Council Conclusions on the Communication from the Commission to the European Parliament and the Council on the EU's humanitarian action: new challenges, same principles.

Hungary welcomes the Communication from the Commission and the Council Conclusions especially in light of the rising humanitarian needs, the shrinking humanitarian space and the growing funding gap. We are experiencing more and more conflicts and disasters around the world and the COVID-19 pandemic has further deteriorated the already fragile situations. Humanitarian aid is one of the most tangible examples of the EU's external action and proof of our solidarity to people in need.

However, regarding paragraph 10, I would like to highlight that Hungary recognizes and promotes equality between women and men in accordance with the Fundamental Law of Hungary, and the primary law, principles and values of the European Union, as well as commitments and principles stemming from the international law. Furthermore, equality between women and men is enshrined in the Treaties of the European Union as a fundamental value. For these reasons and in line with its national legislation, Hungary interprets the concept of 'gender' – in paragraph 10 – as reference to 'sex'."

Adoption

"The Commission considers it legally incorrect that a Council Decision authorising the opening of negotiations indicates a substantive legal basis.

The Decision authorising the opening of negotiations is premised solely on the existence of conferred powers of the Union and not on a determination of a specific competence. Its effect is limited to authorising the Commission or the High Representative, as the case may be, to use its prerogatives under the EU Treaties in order to start negotiations. The scope of these negotiations is therefore determined by the scope of the powers of the Union. Besides, the freedom of the envisaged treaty partner of the Union as regards the determination of the scope of the negotiations. Thus, the precise legal basis for the future agreement can only be determined after the content of the agreement is known.
