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
In view of the Moadem Roundtable of 26 July 2024, delegations will find attached the Action file to follow up on the EU action plan for the Eastern Mediterranean route.

Given the evolving resettlement criteria of EU+ countries in alignment with EU and global priorities worldwide, the EUAA is proactively investigating the possibility of extending similar services to other third countries in the Eastern Mediterranean Region. 



