Delegations will find attached the revised text reflecting the discussions at the meeting of the FoP EDIDP on 19 April.

REVISED PRESIDENCY PROPOSALS FOLLOWING THE TRILOGUE ON 10 APRIL

Explanatory note

The second trilogue and the two technical meetings preceding it focused exclusively on the articles of the Proposal. However, and in view of the need for an integrally revised mandate to be approved by Coreper on 25 April, proposals for the recitals have been added in this revised version.

The **column with numbers** is color-coded: **red** indicates a topic/line that will need further discussions at the political level; **yellow** indicates that differences remain but they should normally be sorted out at the technical level; **green** indicates that a provisional agreement on the given line has been found at the technical level.

The **fourth column** contains both compromise proposals (including provisional agreements) and explanations. Regarding the compromise proposals: 1) ***underlined italics*** text indicates text as it was proposed by the EP; 2) **underlined bold** text indicates text from the Council general approach; 3) ***underlined italics bold*** text indicated text that is identical in both the EP and Council texts; and 4) **bold only** text indicates compromise texts proposed by the Presidency. If both the first (i.e. Commission proposal) and the fourth columns are left empty, it indicates that the relevant EP amendment and/or the Council General Approach addition is not taken.

Explanatory comments are **highlighted in yellow**.
