<p><b>establishing the 'AgoraEU' programme for the period 2028-2034, and repealing Regulations (EU) 2021/692 and (EU) 2021/818</b></p>		
<p>THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT AND THE COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN UNION,</p>		

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Having regard to the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union, and in particular Articles 19(2), 21(2), 24, 167(5), 168(5) and 173(3) thereof,		
Having regard to the proposal from the European Commission,		
After transmission of the draft legislative act to the national parliaments,		
Having regard to the opinion of the European Economic and Social Committee <sup>1</sup> ,  _____

Acting in accordance with the ordinary legislative procedure		
Whereas:		
1. Pursuant to Article 2 of the Treaty on European Union (TEU), the Union is founded on the values of respect for human dignity, freedom, democracy, equality, the rule of law and the respect for human rights, including the rights of persons belonging to minorities, which are common to the Member States in a society in which pluralism, non-discrimination, tolerance, justice, solidarity and equality		


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<p>between women and men prevail ('Union values'). The Union values are reflected in the rights, freedoms and principles set out in the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union (the 'Charter'). Article 3 TEU further mandates the Union <b><u>to promote peace, its values and the well-being of its peoples,</u></b> to promote the protection of the rights of the child, <b><u>to respect its rich cultural and linguistic diversity and to ensure that Europe's cultural heritage is safeguarded and enhanced.</u></b> Article 10 TEU further states that the functioning of the Union shall be founded on representative democracy, that citizens are directly represented at Union level in the European Parliament and that citizens have the right to participate in the democratic life of the Union. Article 20 <b><u>TFEU</u></b> establishes Union citizenship and sets out important rights that citizens of the Union shall, inter alia, enjoy.</p>		
<p>2. Culture and media and promotion and respect of Union values are all crucial components of a free, fair, diverse, inclusive and cohesive Union. Citizens' participation and engagement, in due respect of Union values, constitutes the basis of the democratic life of the Union, with media playing a crucial role in shaping public opinion and free debate. Audiovisual works and all other forms of cultural and creative expressions, including cultural heritage, are essential to Europe's diversity and to forging societal resilience and mutual understanding among European citizens and communities.</p>		


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<p>3. The 'AgoraEU' Programme (the 'Programme') will provide a significant contribution to the attainment and realisation of <del>these</del> <b>those</b> objectives, rights and values.</p>		
<p>4. The Programme should succeed the Creative Europe Programme established by Regulation (EU) 2021/818 of the European Parliament and the Council<sup>3</sup> and the Citizens, Equality, Rights and Values Programme, established by Regulation (EU) 2021/692 of the European Parliament and of the Council<sup>4</sup>. It should streamline various funding actions in support of media freedom and pluralism, fight against disinformation in support of the provision on information on Union affairs. Free and pluralistic media and civil society are among <b>the</b> key watchdogs of the Union's democratic systems, playing a crucial role for democratic resilience, and should be supported. The Programme should also support the cultural, creative and media sectors, harness the power of culture and cultural diversity, enhance the information space, and support the Union's efforts to strengthen a rights-based, inclusive, equal and democratic society. [This Regulation lays down an indicative financial envelope for the 'AgoraEU' Programme<sup>5</sup>. For the purpose of this Regulation, current prices are calculated by applying a fixed 2% deflator.]</p>

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<p>4 Regulation (EU) 2021/692 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 28 April 2021 establishing the Citizens, Equality, Rights and Values Programme and repealing Regulation (EU) No 1381/2013 of the European Parliament and of the Council and Council Regulation (EU) No 390/2014 (OJ L 156, 5.5.2021, p. 1, ELI: <a href="http://data.europa.eu/eli/reg/2021/692/oj">http://data.europa.eu/eli/reg/2021/692/oj</a>).</p> <p>5 Where relevant, the support provided by the Programme shall accelerate or boost investments by addressing market failures or sub-optimal investment situations, in a proportionate manner, avoiding duplication or crowding out, and by incentivising private funding, and shall have Union added-value.</p>		
<p>5. To be effective, the Programme should take into account the specific nature and challenges of the different policy areas and sectors, their different target groups and their particular needs through targeted approaches. <b><u>The Programme should also promote cross-sectoral cooperation between culture, media and civil society.</u></b></p>		
<p>6. In a fast changing economic, social and geopolitical environment, <del>the</del> recent experience has shown the need for a more flexible multiannual financial framework and its programmes. To that effect, and in line with the objectives of the 'AgoraEU' Programme, the funding will take due account of the evolving policy needs and Union's priorities as identified in relevant documents published by the Commission, in Council conclusions</p>		


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<p>and European Parliament resolutions, while ensuring sufficient predictability for the implementation.</p>		
<p>7. The cultural and creative sectors, including, <b>inter alia</b>, <b>the</b> performing arts (<b>for instance</b> such as theatre and dance), literature and book publishing, music, visual arts, tangible and intangible cultural heritage, architecture, archives, libraries and museums, <b>and</b> crafts and design (including fashion design), serve as <b>a</b> 'public good', <b>generating intellectual property, creating</b> generating meaning and embodying the values of the Union. They are also a great asset for the Union and its regions, attracting sustainable tourism and projecting the image of a dynamic continent on the world stage. <b>While fully recognising and putting an emphasis on these sectors' intrinsic and artistic value, the</b> The Programme should <b>also</b> take into account, <del>on the one hand, their intrinsic and artistic value, as well as, on the other hand,</del> their extrinsic social and economic contributions, including to social and territorial cohesion, well-being and health, growth and job creation, competitiveness, creativity and innovation.</p>		
<p>8. The cultural and creative sectors are, however, fragmented along national and linguistic lines <b>within</b> the Union. They also face multiple challenges, such as attacks on freedom of artistic expression, precarious working conditions, digital transformations with the rise of artificial intelligence, and the need to adapt to climate change. The Programme should help those sectors</p>		


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<p>respond to such challenges, untap their full potential and project themselves resolutely into the future while ensuring the widest participation, including from local and regional actors, through various channels and formats.</p>		
<p>9. <b><u>The ideals, principles and values embedded in Europe's cultural heritage constitute a shared source of remembrance, understanding, identity, dialogue, cohesion and creativity for Europe.</u></b> Europe's cultural heritage is a shared and priceless legacy facing budget constraints, natural and human-induced disasters, climate change, and regional conflicts. It is important to safeguard and preserve such a legacy, enhancing access and <b><u>promote</u></b> fostering a collective European identity. Digital preservation further ensures that future generations can learn from, appreciate, and draw inspiration from their cultural heritage.</p>		
<p>10. The Programme should also give financial support to the European Heritage Label and the European Capitals of Culture actions, <b><u>which</u></b> <del>that</del> celebrate and <del>preserve</del> <b><u>safeguard</u></b> Europe's rich cultural diversity and heritage, connecting it to the local level and contributing to culture-driven development strategies.</p>		
<p>11. Europe's <b><u>media industries, encompassing audiovisual and news</u></b> media sectors hold a unique position in our democracies, culture, and economies. <del>They encompass,</del> <del>inter alia,</del> <del>content such as films, series, video games,</del></p>		


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<p>news and information, immersive reality and multimedia, as well as services including theatrical exhibition, television and radio broadcasting, print and online publishing, advertising online videos and podcasts. <b><u>These industries rely on intellectual property rights for the exploitation of their content.</u></b> The digital transformation, notably the rise of artificial intelligence, has accelerated media convergence, changed consumer behaviour, disrupted business and revenue models, as well as intellectual property management and exploitation. The Union should therefore <b><u>support the sustainability and competitiveness of the media industries and</u></b> help the Union's media <b><u>them</u></b> thrive. <b><u>The Union</u></b> should <b><u>encourage</u></b> foster <b><u>creativity and</u></b> innovation and <b><u>enhance</u></b> access to finance, promote cross fertilisation between news, audiovisual and other media sectors and support collaborations between different types of media entities across the Union.</p>		
<p><b><u>11a. Media in the Union increasingly operate on a cross-border basis and contribute to the functioning of the internal market. Recent Union initiatives, in particular Regulation (EU) 2024/1083 (European Media Freedom Act), aim to address obstacles to the free provision of media services and to enhance transparency, legal certainty and fair competition across the Union. The MEDIA+ strand should be coherent with the objectives of Directive No. 2010/13/EU and Regulation (EU) No. 2024/1083, and should place emphasis on media independence and sustainability.</u></b></p>		


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<p>12. The Union audiovisual sector faces <b><u>persistent</u></b> challenges stemming from limited cross-border circulation, shifting consumption habits and the dominance of non-Union players. Given these challenges, Union intervention should support the capacity of European audiovisual and video games industries to create, finance, produce and disseminate European works on all platforms that are available and attractive to audiences within the Union and beyond. <b><u>Support for creation encompasses, inter alia, support for scriptwriting, development, and production of audiovisual works, in particular coproductions and independent production. As market conditions and audiovisual operators continue to evolve, specific criteria for defining independent production should be established in the context of the implementation of the Programme. ¶ Union intervention</u></b> should <b><u>further</u></b> foster transmedia adaptations of intellectual property between different media formats, contribute to promoting collaboration among Member States with different market capacities, <b><u>promote wider participation by entities from markets of different sizes</u></b> and accompany the Union’s audiovisual regulatory framework.</p>		
<p>13. News media outlets and journalists across the Union are under increasing pressure, notably <b><u>owing due</u></b> to the rise of global online platforms <b><u>and the impact of AI services</u></b>, shifting consumption habits and <b><u>the</u></b> growing spread of disinformation. These challenges impact news revenues and distribution, undermining the viability and public trust in news media outlets, and limiting citizens’</p>		


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<p>access to diverse, professionally produced European journalistic content. The Union should support a viable, <b>reliable</b>, independent and diverse information ecosystem, protect journalists under threat <b>and promote their safety and it should</b>, promote media freedom and pluralism, and reinforce the integrity of the information space. <b>It should do so</b>, by promoting measures and enhancing cooperation aimed at tackling disinformation and supporting digital and media literacy, including for young people.</p>		
<p>14. Democracies in the Union are facing increasing challenges. Declining trust of citizens in democratic institutions and processes is exacerbated by disinformation, social polarisation and hatred impacting the electoral and other democratic processes. A whole of society <b>rights-based</b> approach is needed to make European democracy more resilient.</p>		
<p>15. The protection and promotion of fundamental rights contributes to the construction of a more democratic Union. Non-discrimination <b>and equality are</b> is a core principles of the Union <b>that are</b> enshrined in Article <b>8, 10 and 19</b> TFEU and in Articles <b>21 and 23</b> of the Charter. Working towards an equal and discrimination-free society contributes to untapping the potential of individuals in their diversity and to cultural, economic and social growth. It also helps to address important root causes of <b>gender-based violence and</b> violence against vulnerable groups, <b>as such violence</b> which in turn is a</p>		


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<p>frontal attack on equality. <b><u>Accordingly</u></b>, <del>Therefore</del>, the Programme should promote actions to address all forms of discrimination and intolerance, namely direct and indirect discrimination. <b><u>In so doing, it should</u></b>, paying attention to the specific forms of structural and intersectional discrimination, with a view to <b><u>advancing equality and non-discrimination mainstreaming and supporting relevant Union policy frameworks</u></b>. <b><u>In addition</u></b>, <del>the</del> Programme should support actions to prevent and combat all forms of xenophobia and racism, antisemitism and anti-Muslim hatred, homophobia, biphobia, transphobia, interphobia, intolerance and discrimination based on gender identity, intolerance towards persons belonging to minorities, including Roma, as well as hate speech <b><u>and hate crime</u></b>. The Programme should also contribute to enabling the Union to deliver on the commitment taken as <del>P</del>party to the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities adopted on 13 December 2006<sup>6</sup> to promote, protect and ensure the full and equal enjoyment of all human rights and fundamental freedoms by all persons with disabilities. <b><u>The Programme should also ensure structured and continuous dialogue with civil society organisations.</u></b></p> <hr/> <p><sup>6</sup> OJ L 23, 27.01.2010, p. 35-36</p>		
<p>16. The rights to <b><u>respect for private life and family life</u></b> <del>privacy</del> and the protection of personal data, enshrined <del>respectively</del> in Article 7 of the Charter and in Article 16 TFEU and Article 8 of the Charter <b><u>respectively</u></b>, are</p>		


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<p>enforced through a dedicated Regulation<sup>7</sup> and Directive<sup>8</sup>. The Union’s legal framework lays down provisions to ensure that the right to protection of personal data is effectively protected. These legal instruments entrust the national data protection supervisory authorities with the task of promoting public awareness and understanding <b>of</b> the risks, rules, safeguards and rights in relation to the processing of personal data. The Programme should contribute to raising awareness <b>and</b>, carry out studies and other relevant activities in this field. <b><u>This should be done, for instance, including</u></b> through the national data protection supervisory authorities, given the importance of the right to the protection of personal data in times of rapid technological developments.</p> <hr/> <p>7 OJ L 119, 4.5.2016, p. 1-88.</p> <p>8 OJ L 119, 4.5.2016, p. 89-131.</p>		
<p>17. Gender equality is a fundamental <b><u>value right</u></b> and an objective of the Union and should be <del>supported</del> <b><u>promoted</u></b> by the Programme. Despite many achievements, significant challenges remain, which require <b><u>additional</u></b> to reinforce the Union’s commitment <b><u>by the Union</u></b>. This includes: working towards freedom from gender-based violence; <b><u>promoting</u></b> the highest standards of health, including in particular sexual and reproductive health <b><u>and rights</u></b>; equal pay and economic empowerment; work-life balance <b><u>and the equal sharing</u></b></p>		


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<p><b><u>of care responsibilities between women and men;</u></b>  <b><u>care, equal participation in the labour market;</u></b>  <b><u>employment, career opportunities and fair working</u></b>  <b><u>conditions;</u></b> quality, <b><u>accessible</u></b> and inclusive education;  <b><u>political participation and equal representation;</u></b> <b><u>effective</u></b>  <b><u>institutional mechanisms that deliver on women’s</u></b>  <b><u>rights;</u></b> actively tackling gender stereotypes; and  addressing intersectional discrimination. <b><u>The promotion</u></b>  <b><u>of gender equality and gender mainstreaming in all</u></b>  <b><u>activities of the Union is therefore a core task for the</u></b>  <b><u>Union, and should be supported by the Programme.</u></b></p>		
<p>18. Gender-based violence and violence against women, children, young persons and other groups at risk, such as LGBTIQ persons and persons with disabilities, constitute a serious violation of fundamental rights and continue to persist throughout the Union, in all social and economic contexts. Violence against women and persons belonging to other groups at risk is a violation of human rights and a frontal attack on equality. Thus, preventing and addressing such violence is a societal imperative. <b><u>This</u></b> <del>and</del> contributes to tackling such discrimination as well as addressing the impacts of violence, including on health. At the same time, ensuring a discrimination-free society will also help address the root causes of violence against vulnerable groups, since they are intrinsically linked. Therefore, the Programme should continue the longstanding Union efforts <b><u>to</u></b> <del>in</del> preventing, responding to and fighting violence at all levels, as well as <del>in</del> protecting and supporting all direct and indirect victims and survivors of violence, building on the five</p>		



<p>consecutive generations of the Daphne programme and strand<sup>9</sup>. <p>19. In accordance with Union acquis on equal treatment, the Member States have set up independent bodies for the promotion of equal treatment ('equality bodies'), which play a key role in promoting equality and ensuring the effective application of equal treatment legislation. <b>In addition</b> <del>Further</del>, the Programme should support the</p>		



<p>European Network of Equality Bodies (Equinet) composed of the national equality bodies as provided for by Council Directive (EU) 2024/1499<sup>11</sup> and Directive (EU) 2024/1500 of the European Parliament and of the Council<sup>12</sup>. <b><u>This is due to the fact that</u></b> since Equinet is the only entity which ensures <b><u>cooperation and promotes capacity-building and the</u></b> coordination of activities between equality bodies. <p>20. Citizens throughout the Union, many of whom regularly or at least occasionally travel to, live, study, work or <b>do voluntary work</b> <del>volunteer</del> in another Member State, should feel able to enjoy and exercise their citizenship</p>		

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<p>rights and to place their trust in equal access, full enforceability and protection of their rights without any discrimination, no matter where in the Union they happen to be. Citizens should be more aware of their rights deriving from citizenship of the Union, namely their right to move and reside freely in the Union, their voting rights when residing in another Member State, their right to petition the European Parliament in any of the official languages, their right to submit citizens' initiatives and their right to lodge complaints with the European ombudsman against institutional maladministration.</p>		
<p>21. Encouraging citizens to play a more active role in democracy at Union level will strengthen European civil society and <b>promote</b> <del>foster</del> the development of a European identity. Civil society, <b>including small and grassroots civil society organisations</b>, therefore needs to be supported <b>and empowered</b> in promoting, safeguarding and raising awareness of Union values and in contributing to the effective enjoyment of rights under Union law. When Union citizens participate in the democratic life of the Union, they contribute to making a <del>reality</del> representative democracy <b>a reality. This is</b>, a principle on which the functioning of the Union is founded and which gives <b>actual</b> <del>concrete</del> expression to the value of democracy enshrined in Article 2 TEU.</p>		
<p>22. In order to bring the Union closer to its citizens and to <b>encourage</b> <del>foster</del> democratic participation, a variety of</p>		

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<p>actions and coordinated efforts are necessary. <b><u>There is a need to encourage citizens’ understanding of the policy-making process so as to promote a greater understanding and awareness of</u></b> European citizenship and European identity, <del>should be developed and advanced by encouraging citizens’ understanding of the policy-making process, and by</del> <b><u>Equally there is a need to promote</u></b> civic engagement in the actions of the Union. <b><u>Activities focused on</u></b> <del>Remembrance activities</del> and critical reflection on Europe’s historical memory, <b><u>raising, for instance, greater awareness of the impact of authoritarian and totalitarian regimes,</u></b> are necessary <b><u>in order</u></b> to make citizens aware of the common <b><u>European</u></b> history. <b><u>Such activities also help,</u></b> <del>and to</del> lay the foundation for a common future and shared values. Furthermore, supporting <b><u>and empowering</u></b> civil society organisations at local, regional, national and transnational level in the areas covered by the Programme will contribute to increasing citizens’ engagement in society and ultimately to their active involvement in the democratic life of the Union. At the same time, supporting activities that promote mutual understanding, intercultural dialogue, cultural and linguistic diversity, social inclusion and respect for others <b><u>promotes</u></b> <del>fosters</del> a sense of belonging to the Union and <b><u>a sense</u></b> of a common citizenship under a European identity, based on a shared understanding of our common European values, culture, history and heritage.</p>		


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<p>23. Civil society organisations, and other civic space actors, such as independent human rights bodies, equality bodies and Ombudspersons <del>institutions</del>, play a vital role in contributing to the implementation of policy, encouraging people’s participation, holding institutions accountable, and driving positive change. The Programme should help ensure sufficient resources, <del>and</del> <b><u>create</u></b> an enabling environment <b><u>in which they can</u></b> for <del>them to</del> operate independently, freely, safely, <del>and</del> effectively, <b><u>and support a thriving civic space</u></b>. To this end, Union funding should complement efforts at national level by supporting, protecting, empowering and building their capacity, as emphasised in the European Parliament resolution of 19 April 2018<sup>13</sup>, as well as Council conclusions of 10 March 2023<sup>14</sup> and 7 March 2025<sup>15</sup>. 


