Sweden from A to Z – A piece of Swedish culture

February might be the month that is the coldest and greyest in Sweden. However, to some swedes, this month is the highlight of the year, since this means the start of the annual television competition, known as Melodifestivalen. Melodifestivalen contains sub-competitions which eventually leads to the big final where the winner gets to represent Sweden in Eurovision Song Contest (ESC). Since Sweden's debut in the competition in 1958, we have only missed the competition three times which entails the meaning it has for the swedes. Sweden has won ESC 6 times (only Ireland has more wins). ABBA (which we talked about in the first flash) actually won Sweden's first ESC, with the song Waterloo in 1974.
